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**Bold Live Programs at The Broad Will Highlight Robert Therrien's
Influence on Artists and Musicians**

New Commissions Will Transform the Museum Like Therrien Reimagined the Everyday

LOS ANGELES, CA – In conjunction with [*Robert Therrien: This is a Story*](#), The Broad will present a slate of live programs that reshape how audiences encounter the museum, including immersive, cross-disciplinary commissions—site-responsive sound works and experiences that invite visitors to actively engage with the space—echoing the artist's ambitious approach to scale and form. As part of the celebrated Los Angeles artist's largest museum presentation to date, the programs bring together sculptors, interdisciplinary artists, and musicians whose new commissions echo **Robert Therrien's** radical sense of transformation. Starting on the exhibition's opening day, November 22, 2025, The Broad will host the first of two Un-Private Collection conversations inspired by Therrien's visionary works, which he produced just miles from the museum in his Downtown Los Angeles studio. The opening-day conversation brings together contemporary sculptors **Samara Golden, Piero Golia, and Max Hooper Schneider**—known for their ambitious, immersive environments—for a discussion on the sculptural world building to create communal experiences in a lively conversation moderated by exhibition curator **Ed Schad**. On February 27, 2026, during Frieze Week Los Angeles, the second Un-Private Collection conversation will examine sculpture's ability to invite concentrated and often solitary encounters, featuring artists **Kelly Akashi, Sharif Farrag, and Guadalupe Rosales**, and will be moderated by **Schad**.

In addition to two special Family Weekend Workshops, one of which will feature performances by the **Bob Baker Marionette Theater**, the museum will present **Wild Up: The Great Learning** on February 7, 2026. Wild Up, the orchestral collective known for challenging traditional concert practices, will bring together thirty performers to execute two sections of **Cornelius Cardew's** monumental 1971 work *The Great Learning*. In this performance, voices and percussion create soundscapes generated collaboratively by the public and the Wild Up orchestra, that traverse from the Therrien galleries into The Broad lobby. On March 7, 2026, sound artists and musicians **Sarah Davachi** and **Robert Takahashi Novak** will debut new commissions that activate the museum lobby with a spatial sound system designed to resonate with The Broad's architecture and acoustics. Their performances are created to evoke experiences of space, memory and perception.

Adding to this season's programming, The Broad continues its partnership with Indigenous artists and creators, building on recent exhibitions of **William Kentridge, Joseph Beuys, and Jeffrey Gibson** as well as the museum's long-term reforestation project in Elysian Park, ***Social Forest: Oaks of Tovaangar***. Organized biannually by **The Chapter House**, a local organization that cultivates Indigenous joy through art, performance, and celebration, the museum will host the free, day-long event **LA NDN Flea – A Native Market** on Saturday, December 13, 2025. Guests can shop clothing, jewelry, and original artworks from local vendors, participate in family-friendly activities, and enjoy a curated DJ set by **deesco**. Later that evening, the museum will present a special live edition of the beloved comedy podcast **Sage-Based Wisdom**, hosted by **Jana Schmieding** (Lakota) and **Brian Bahe** (Tohono O'odham, Hopi, Navajo), and featuring a performance by 21-year-old rapper and environmental activist with Mexico roots **Xiuhtezcatl**, who released his third album *TONATIUH* in September 2025.

Building on a legacy that includes artists like James Turrell, Robert Irwin, Noah Purifoy, and Helen Pashgian, *World Building* as a practice has a vibrant and visible presence in contemporary Los Angeles sculpture. The Broad's *World Building* program features three Los Angeles-based artists who are known for ambitious sculptural environments: **Samara Golden**, **Piero Golia**, and **Max Hooper Schneider**. Artists who work in the spirit of *World Building* often pursue any medium and any method to give their vision life, crossing many disciplines, and, at times, producing work that is difficult to classify as sculpture at all. Commemorate World AIDS Day at The Broad with a panel discussion featuring multidisciplinary artists **Rubén Esparza**, **Ken Gonzales-Day**, and **Joey Terrill**, and photographer and documentarian **Judy Ornelas Sisneros**, moderated by journalist **Carolina A. Miranda**. Artists have long raised their voices against injustice, channeled their unique talents to bring awareness to important topics, picked up cameras to document the world as it needs to be seen, and rallied movements around shared ideals. The Broad collection includes many artists whose artwork addresses cultural crises and current social and political topics.

Throughout their careers, the speakers featured in The Broad's World AIDS Day 2025 program have defiantly and proudly shaped how we see the AIDS crisis along with other pertinent issues. This conversation will trace a timeline from the US government's mishandling the onset of HIV/AIDS in the 1980s, to Proposition 8 for same-sex marriage, the COVID-19 crisis, and repeated attempts to silence and strip rights from LGBTQIA+ individuals, immigrants, and other marginalized people.

Modeled after flea markets found on many Native American reservations, the biannual **LA NDN Flea – A Native Market** features everything from recycled clothing to handcrafted jewelry, original art, and much more. Joining the event will be nonprofit organizations and resource groups providing community support and information. Guests can pick up a free, limited-run poster featuring the powerful and vibrant artwork by Broad collection artist, **Jeffrey Gibson** (Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians and Cherokee), titled [THE RETURNED MALE STUDENT FAR TOO FREQUENTLY GOES BACK TO THE RESERVATION AND FALLS INTO THE OLD CUSTOM OF LETTING HIS HAIR GROW LONG](#) (2024).

Visitors can connect with local Indigenous groups, dance to curated DJ sets by **deesco** (Teme-Augama Anishnabai), enjoy special food vendor offerings, and participate in a family-friendly hands-on activity that celebrates the vibrant intersection of Los Angeles's cultural heritage and natural environment with a custom board game designed and developed by artist, musician, researcher, and educator, **Lazaro Arvizu Jr.** (Gabrielino/Tongva).

Inspired by The Broad's special exhibition, **[Robert Therrien: This is a Story](#)**, Family Weekend Workshops offer a look at Therrien's artwork in a new light and allows visitors to make their own seat at the table. Attendees will be able to step into Therrien's shoes and see the everyday in a whole new way.

Use stencils to create parts that make up a whole as you build a sculpture taking a cue from Therrien's most-used forms. Cut out your shapes and build your object using wire, cardboard, pipe cleaners, and more. Make it your own by decorating with fabric or paint sticks to bring your work to life. Don't forget to experience Therrien's exhibition, located on the first floor of the museum—and see if you can find his sculpture of an unusually large set of furniture elsewhere in the museum (clue: it's always on view on the third floor!).

GRAMMY-nominated orchestral collective **Wild Up** presents ***The Great Learning, Paragraphs***

2 and 7 by **Cornelius Cardew**. A ritual of gathering in community through sound, Wild Up members and an ensemble of 30 pre-appointed non-musicians perform two sections of this monumental work in which voices and percussion unfold through listening and response. Creating a vast field of resonance and play, Wild Up musicians will teach the work to a public ensemble, learning through repetitions and echoes, culminating in a performance where music becomes a shared space to embody collective creativity. Composed between 1968 and 1971, Cardew designed *The Great Learning* for a radically open ensemble that blurred lines between trained musicians and amateurs, grounding the piece in inclusivity, process, and duration.

Presented in conjunction with the special exhibition [Robert Therrien: This is a Story](#), *The Great Learning* touches on themes both intimate and monumental, plays with scale to change how we perceive the world, and collapses the distance between the personal and the epic. Therrien's large-scale sculptures can evoke childlike awe; Cardew's music sparks collective joy in making something bigger than ourselves. Both artists reveal how ordinary materials—wood, metal, voice, breath—can hold memory and become extraordinary.

The second of the two panel discussions contextualizes L.A.'s current terrain of sculptors within its history. *Distinct Encounters through Object Making*, taking place during Frieze Week Los Angeles, examines sculpture that invites concentrated and often solitary encounters with viewers. The conversation features **Kelly Akashi**, who works across diverse materials to explore the impermanence of the natural world; **Sharif Farrag**, whose maximalist ceramic sculptures create organized chaos; and **Guadalupe Rosales**, whose artworks archive and celebrate the collective memories of Chicano youth culture of the 1990s. The discussion will be moderated by **Ed Schad**, curator of [Robert Therrien: This is a Story](#).

An evening of specially commissioned compositions by electroacoustic and minimalist organist, **Sarah Davachi**, and conceptual sound and contemporary electronic music artist, **Robert Takahashi Novak**. Activating the unique physical characteristics of the museum's lobby which is at once cavernous and cathedral-like yet intimate, the two Los Angeles based musicians will utilize a spatial sound system to realize their unique styles and methods, unlocking the potential for somatic experience of deep listening and self-awareness.

Presented tied to the special exhibition [Robert Therrien: This is a Story](#), the world premiere of Novak's and Davachi's individual works investigate human scale in relation to physical surroundings, memory and the individual's response to experience, and how perception can

shift upon close observation. These ideas can also be found in Therrien's sculptures and installations that evoke sly shifts in our perception of belonging in space and time, and alter how we experience objects and their surrounding environments. These site-specific performances will be created to resonate with the unique sonic qualities of the architecture of The Broad's lobby.
